Each of these stakeholder groups shared with committee members their expertise and opinions about the leadership necessary to continue our strong investment in music. Each group also imagined the role music could take in the church’s growth.

The information we have heard from these music stakeholders as well as the excellent feedback from the two congregational meetings in May and June will serve as the basis for a Leadership Profile for our vacant Music Minister position. The Leadership Profile will outline the skills and attributes we are looking for in a Music Minister as well as primary roles and responsibilities. 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The “People of Wednesday Night”

In an article titled, *A Catholic Looks at Baptist Spirituality*, Dr. Samuel Weber calls Baptists the “People of the Wednesday night.” He implores Baptists to cherish and protect this part of their common life: “I urge you to preserve the Wednesday night. Guard it faithfully and keep it continually. Do not allow the pressures of modern living to take over. You do the world a great favor and bring many blessings on all of us when...you gather together to hear the word of God, to pray, and to break bread in...the ‘company of those who believe.’”

In encouraging Baptists to remain, “People of the Wednesday night,” Dr. Weber is taking a page out of the book of Acts. There we read of a vital early church that “Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, *they broke bread and ate their food with glad and generous hearts*” (2:46). This “breaking of bread” continued Jesus’ own emphasis on shared meals and shared fellowship. Not coincidentally, Jesus put a meal--the Lord’s Supper--at the center of his kingdom.

Gathering with fellow believers to rub shoulders, pass the potatoes, and say our prayers continues to be a vital part of the Christian life. However, finding time for shared meals at home, much less at church, is a growing challenge. Almost everyone, it seems, is busier than ever. And for many families, after school sports and other activities spill over into week nights and weekends.

Despite such challenges, our church seeks to make Wednesday night a “sweet spot” in the rhythm of our congregation’s life. By committing 90 minutes from 5:30-7:00 PM on Wednesday nights, one can enjoy a good meal with others, pray for those who are struggling in our church and world, and learn a valuable Bible or life lesson, all while growing in one’s sense of connection and community with one’s church family.

During that sacred 90 minutes, our children learn to sing in age-appropriate choirs while youth learn music by practicing bells. Then the children enjoy engaging times of meal conversation and learning with our able, attentive Children’s Ministry Associate, Chrissy Hardy. The loving, affable Josh Godwin creates a safe pace for our youth to gather and decompress. The remarkably resourceful Diane Lipsett and her Faith Formation team create compelling learning opportunities for adults.

For those who can stay longer, children and others often head over to the Wellness and Community Center at 7:00 PM for a game of pickup basketball, hula-Hoop, or a walk around the track. And Lauren Winkelman and our new interim Choral Director, Bryon Grohman, welcome both returning veterans and newbies to the 7:00 PM Chancel Choir practice.

With “Welcome Back Sunday” on August 26, almost upon us, now is a great time to reassess priorities and schedule, and make time for what matters most. Hopefully, that includes gathering with your church family on Sunday mornings. I also hope we will ever be a “People of the Wednesday Night.” Because it’s hard to be family or to feel like family without eating together at least once a week.

Racial Equity Task Force Formed

Since our church's founding and our first pastor, Knollwood has been committed to the struggle of civil rights and the cause of racial justice. Currently, this commitment is evident in topical studies, book groups, sermons, and missions efforts to improve equity for communities of color in our city and region.

With that rich foundation, a significant number of Knollwood members are expressing a desire for even more initiatives that will: (1) invite deeper understanding of the dynamics of discrimination, the continuing effects of racism, the advantages that accompany being white, and the complex goal of racial justice; (2) equip and enable members of Knollwood to act in informed ways to contribute to equitable treatment, opportunities, and outcomes in our places of employment, our community involvements, and our social relations.

Whether or not Knollwood is likely to become a more racially or ethnically mixed congregation, we work and live as Christians in a diverse society. We want to live out our faith in informed ways that contribute to righteousness and justice, relationship-building, and the wellbeing of all members of our community. We therefore want to know and do better in addressing root causes of racism, including in ourselves.

To that end, the DEC has appointed a task force to undertake three tasks. First, to host a training opportunity at Knollwood for members, teachers, leaders, deacons, and staff on the topic of racial justice. Second, to evaluate the outcome of the training and determine what steps may follow. Third, recommend how we might incorporate our learning into the life of our congregation, and how we might intentionally carry forward the work of racial equity in our church and community.

The task force is made up of the following members: Forrest Causby (Chair), Diane Lipsett (Staff Liaison), Gayle Anderson, Joy Vermillion Heinsohn, Mark Jensen, Katharine Martin, Kevin Mauney, and Spence O'Neill.

Summer Ends, New Adventures Begin

As we near the final weeks of summer 2018, I reflect on what an incredible summer it has been with KBC. ym. We've gone across oceans. We've helped navigate the rolling rivers of VBS. We've served communities through PASSPORT-missions camp. How all of this was done in the span of five weeks, we may never know.



But those five weeks were an incredible experience for all involved, especially me.

Watching the joy and dedication with which our young people served was inspiring to watch, and a true treasure to be part of. The group who recently returned from PASSPORTmissions at Furman University worked, cried, and laughed our way through a week of serving the community of Greenville, South Carolina. When we weren't sorting books at the local Goodwill or getting covered in clay and tar while waterproofing the basement and foundation of an old neighborhood church, we were learning about what is "Enough." Bible studies, group devotions, and thoughtful worship services all helped us explore how God's grace is sufficient for our lives.

While summer is normally a time for seeking quiet and relaxation for recharging, these experiences have recharged my batteries more than any day off. Being a "First Friend" to Visitors

Try this Personal Inventory to challenge yourself as a "First Friend" to Visitors.

Imagine for a moment that you are a visitor to Knollwood Baptist Church. You may want to slip in and out or you are interested not just in the worship or programs but also want to be warmly welcomed.

Is there anyone reaching out to you and not just handing a bulletin to you? Do church members even notice that you are there? Many of us may not remember how difficult searching for a new church can be.

A group called the EXODUS network which helps people relocate and connect to church communities in the US and Canada offers this inventory as a way to affirm and challenge you.

1. I search out visitors and newcomers at my church

2. I try to remember the names of the newcomers and introduce newcomers to other people in the church.

3. I invite newcomers to eat lunch with me or encourage them to join me to a church program or event.
 Always Sometimes Never
4. I am able to look past a person's color, clothing, social standing, gender, or any other category.
 Always Sometimes Never
5. I try to assist newcomers to locate resources and information they request that may be helpful about the church or community.
 Always Sometimes Never
6. I don't look for visitors but just stay with my same friends.
 Always Sometimes Never
7. I invite a neighbor, stranger, co-worker, or school friend to come with me or meet me at church.
 Always Sometimes Never

How can we welcome the stranger as Jesus encourages us? Commit yourself to invest in an area above. Ask a staff member or a friend in the church to assist you as needed.
