WCC Team Celebrates and Concludes Work

One year after the building's dedication, the Wellness and Community Center (WCC) Team met on May 20 to review and conclude its work.

Established by the Deacon Executive Committee in September 2015, the Team's charge was to plan for the use of the building, with special attention to matching the needs of our ministries to construction and amenities.

"At the beginning of the process, I asked the team to think broadly and deeply about how the congregation wanted the WCC to serve Knollwood's mission—keeping in mind that we didn't want to open the building and realize that we had missed important needs, large or small," said Ben Floyd, who chaired the Team. "We reiterated that point at every meeting. We are happy that the adjustments that have been or are being made over the past year are minor ones, and use of the WCC is exceeding expectations."

The building is being used extensively by members, neighbors of Knollwood, and our community partners. With the atrium opening to the church offices and a strong security system, the building is user-friendly and operating with fewer volunteers than initially envisioned.

Dr. Bob Setzer reported that the staff is extremely pleased with the new offices and enjoy visiting with KBC members who come by to use the walking track. The conference room is a very popular meeting space and much-appreciated by all who use it.

In addition to the many new and relocated activities taking place in the WCC, other ministries are using freed space, especially in Noffsinger. For example, the Baptist News Global has now located in part of the office space (see page 4), and the Through-the-Week School had added classrooms there.

Also during the May 20 meeting, Marlin Yoder reported that WCC capital campaign pledge payments are being received on or ahead of schedule.

Thanks to the many Knollwood members who make the ministries of the WCC possible through their financial gifts, leadership, and service.

FROM THE BACK SIDE OF THE PULPIT

Where Wellness and Community Happen *One-Year Anniversary of the WCC*

When it comes to celebrating the one-year anniversary of the Wellness and Community Center (WCC), it's hard to know where to start. So I'll start right where I am. Here. Now. Today. In the WCC.

It's Tuesday morning, about 10:30 a.m. The WCC is buzzing with activity. In the gym, seniors are playing Pickleball, a game that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and ping pong. The gym divider is down, separating the gym floor into two distinct courts. Some seniors are lounging on the bleachers and enjoying one another's company, waiting their turn. Many are not members at Knollwood but neighbors and friends from the wider community.

Meanwhile, squealing, smiling preschoolers are running and playing on the upstairs walking track. It is raining, and on wet or terribly hot days, the WCC is the rec-time refuge for our Through-the-Week School. The teachers of the preschoolers are walking in pairs, contentedly talking while keeping an eye on their charges. When pickleball is not in session and the whole gym is available, the preschoolers are endlessly inventive in playing downstairs with jump ropes, hula hoops, a parachute, and a colorful assortment of kickballs and beach balls.

Upstairs in the computer room, a Knollwood member is helping a Hispanic neighbor with her English. At other times, Knollwood members tutor refugee family members in English or American culture and customs, usually in the Community Room. But the Sew and So's are in there this morning. Their already impressive productivity in creating woven expressions of KBC love has soared now that they have dedicated storage space for their equipment and supplies.

In the Arts and Hearts Room, chair yoga is quietly, serenely proceeding. But that room regularly births more flamboyant expressions of faith and life, like the amazing Pentecost Sunday pottery extravaganza that culminated in holy fire in the Noffinger traffic circle (ask Rodney Stilwell or Pam Boehme!).

When school is out later today, a couple dozen boys, mostly from the neighborhood, will descend on the gym to play basketball. This evening, a much larger and more diverse group, drawn from all over Winston-Salem, will play. The gym will thunder with their racing feet and triumphant shouts.

Throughout the day, a succession of guests make their way upstairs to the office reception area to ask a question, get help, or speak with a minister. This afternoon, our ministerial staff will gather in the WCC's lovely, inviting conference room with windows and lots of light. It's a far cry from D-100, the dark "dungeon" of the old house that used to sit on the edge of campus.

Well, I've run out of space, but I still haven't told the half of what the Wellness and Community Center has come to mean since we dedicated the building on May 21, 2017. But in short, it has brought our church and community closer together through vital ministries of recreation, art, service, hospitality, and welcome.

These days, I can't imagine life at Knollwood without the WCC. And I'm so grateful to God and this congregation that I don't have to.

Music Ministry Transition/Search Committee Reports To Membership

Since its first meeting in late January, the Music Ministry Transition/Search Committee has conducted interviews with nine people who are influential in current music ministry including successful music ministers and professors preparing students for music ministry. From these interviews, the committee determined the top trends of successful music ministry in the following areas: staffing, education and preparation, technology, choirs and ensembles, and musical styles. In addition to identifying and understanding the top trends in music ministry, the committee discovered common recommendations in each area from the pool of interviewees.

The trends and recommendations were presented to the membership in a meeting during the Sunday School hour on May 20. The meeting included time for participants to provide feedback on the recommendations to the committee. This meeting will be repeated after worship on June 3 from 12:15 pm-1:30 pm. The Music Ministry Transition/Search Committee will use the feedback from these two congregational meetings as well as conversations with the Chancel Choir, our youth and parents to develop a Leadership Profile for Knollwood's music ministry.
