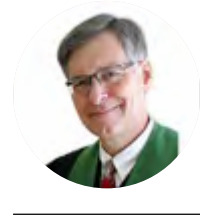

A Repeat Performance?

Almost a year-and-a-half ago, our beloved Minister of Music, Ken Wilson retired. At the time, it was hard to imagine life at Knollwood without Ken. But thanks to the able leadership, first of David Winkelman and then of Bryon Grohman--with Lauren Winkelman working miracles, mostly behind the scenes--our church's ministry of music continued to thrive.

But as to finding Knollwood's next Minister of Music, that seemed a daunting challenge. The world of denominationally supported seminaries that produced Ken's generation of music ministers no longer exists. Today, the seminary that instilled such strong musical and ministry skills in Ken does not even offer a church music degree.

Given the changing landscape of church music, our Transition/Search Committee consulted with a number of recognized leaders in the field. Among the learnings gleaned from those consultations: (1) There is no one "right" way to do worship and music; each church must find and work its own unique niche and mission; (2) In addition to chancel choirs, churches are using a variety of groups and ensembles to offer music in worship (as we have done at Knollwood for years); (3) Whatever a church's primary model for worship--and ours is "liturgical"--churches must broaden their repertoire of musical styles in order to reach the next generation.

Armed with that knowledge, our search committee set out to find the best possible candidate to become Knollwood's next Minister of Music, and we found her: Rozanna Goocey! Rozanna has a rare blend of personal, pastoral, and musical gifts. She grew up in a home where both parents were ministers so she intuitively grasps the nuances and flow of ministry in the church. And yet she has a heart for reaching beyond the church's comfort zone to draw more pilgrims into the way of Jesus.

Rozanna is a classically trained musician who loves many genres of music including global music, spirituals, and both traditional and contemporary hymns. Further, she believes that congregational song is at the heart of the church's worship and is committed to helping not just our choirs, but also our congregation, sing passionately and well. Finally, Rozanna appreciates and wants for her family an intergenerational congregation like Knollwood with both the vitality of youth and the depth and maturity of age.

In short, I believe--and given the unanimous vote to call her, Knollwood believes--that Rozanna Goocey is the God-called minister to help our congregation sing its way into the 21st century.

So open your arms and heart to the Goocey family and welcome and encourage them in every way possible. After all, the last time a gifted young 30-something Minister of Music came to Knollwood, with a spouse and two small children, he served this congregation faithfully and well for over three decades.

I'm hoping for a repeat performance.

Bolton Pantry Needs Your Help as We Begin Second Year of Operation

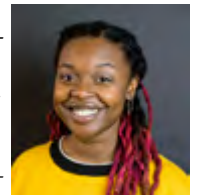

In April, volunteers at the Bolton Elementary Pantry celebrated the one-year anniversary of the pantry's opening. The Bolton Pantry is a collaborative effort of three churches: Knollwood, Wesley Memorial United Methodist, and Trinity Presbyterian Church. The pantry is open to all Bolton Elementary families and is open on the second and fourth Tuesdays

each month, serving an average of 42 families per month. Many volunteers work together to make the pantry successful: volunteers stock the shelves with food from Second Harvest Food Bank, call families on Monday nights to remind them that we will be open the next day, check participants in when they arrive at the pantry, and help them with selecting pantry items and loading groceries into their cars.

This one-year anniversary also marks a time of change at the pantry. Beginning in August, Beth Fields is going to assume the role of pantry coordinator, taking over for Spence O'Neill. We also have a new intern from the WFU School of Divinity, Barbara "Bobbie" Rogers. Bobbie is a second-year student from Laurinburg. A graduate of Howard University, she has served as a Global Mission Fellow for the United Methodist Church in Moscow, Russia, where she served the low-income migrant and refugee community. She is excited to begin work at the Bolton Pantry this summer.

Since 1998, Eddy and Cindy Ruble have served as Cooperative Baptist Fellowship field personnel, with a long investment in ministry in Malaysia and Indonesia. Cindy works as an Advocate for Women and Children. She has spent many years working to aid and empower the survivors of human trafficking, from rescue to case-work to repatriation. Eddy is CBF’s International Disaster Response Coordinator. Building on experience gained from responding to the Asian tsunami in 2004, he continued working in disaster relief, responding to ensuing earthquakes, typhoons and floods in other regions of Asia. Eddy works collaboratively with donor partners, conventions, and national Baptists as together they respond to disasters around the world, with a focus on long-term development.

The Enneagram is a powerful tool that can help us recognize the habits and patterns of our personalities, which are deeply rooted in illusions we carry about ourselves, the world, and God. Through teaching, small group work, sharing stories on panels, and spiritual practices, this summer weekend retreat will invite participants to consider new narratives about themselves and God that interrupt these habitual thoughts and feelings and cultivate greater compassion and freedom.

The retreat leader is Christopher T. Copeland, Director of Leadership Development and Spiritual Life, and Assistant Professor of the Practice of Spirituality at Wake Forest School of Divinity. Chris is an ordained Baptist minister, spiritual director, and certified Enneagram teacher through the Narrative Enneagram where he serves as an adjunct faculty. For the past 25 years, Chris has been learning and teaching about the Enneagram to universities, non-profits, and religious organizations, helping more people to discover this tool for building self-awareness, cultivating compassion, and deepening spiritual growth.

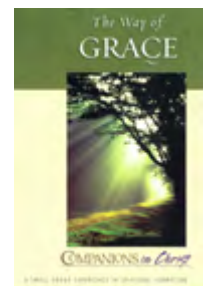

There are nearly 100 volunteers who keep our Children's Ministry running on a weekly basis. We have six developmentally appropriate Sunday School classes, Children's Worship offered on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays for our younger elementary children, and weekly Worship Care provided for our youngest worshippers every Sunday. On Wednesday nights we average about 30 elementary children for Kids.Connect. Before we even look at a special event like VBS, or Trunk or Treat or an Easter Celebration, the weekly labor of love offered by members in this community is truly remarkable. I'd wager that there are not many other ministries at Knollwood that engage and involve quite so many leaders. Our parents are among those who are leading, but we also rely heavily on other demographics within this church to provide all the programming we offer. You are what make our parents feel safe and welcomed as they drop off their kids and you are why our children are eager to come back to church week after week. Simply put: this is holy work.

We have some "job openings" for our 2019-2020 school year. Our preschool division will be adding a classroom next year to keep our children grouped in developmentally appropriate clusters. You may ask to be with any age group: Babies, Toddlers/ Twos, Threes, or Fours/Kindergarten. You only serve one Sunday every eight weeks. There's no curriculum to teach. The second hour is simply time to play and get to know our youngest Knollwood friends.

Summer Time Play Time

But this is North Carolina, and most sunny days good for play also come with inhumane humidity or the threat of an early-afternoon thunderstorm. What are you to do when you just want to play, but the weather says otherwise? Come to the WCC.

We have moved into summer recreation mode here at KBC, with different hours to accommodate the need for folks to be active on a schedule not centered around school times. We'll host a dedicated time for KBC.kids every Monday afternoon; all you need to bring is an adult and a want to have some fun. If pick-up basketball is more your speed, then stop by every Monday (11 AM-2 PM) and Wednesday (1-3:30 PM). Or if you want to try your hand at a game for all ages, come out for open pickleball every Tuesday and Thursday morning (8-11 AM) or a KBC members-only time on Monday evenings (7-8 PM).

Finally, we have a very exciting new way to engage our congregation in recreational fun this summer. We will be hosting learning clinics for young children and beginners to learn the basic skills and get some experience in three sports: soccer (7/11), basketball (7/25), and pickleball (8/8). There are no charges for these and no prerequisites: if your child has expressed an interest in playing these sports but needs to learn some basics to gain confidence, be sure to mark your calendars for these dates.
