Lent is a 40-day period of spiritual preparation for Easter that harkens back to the early centuries of the church. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, a day of worship, reflection and repentance. From biblical times onward, ashes have been applied to the forehead to signify repentance and commitment.

God's Opinion That Life Must Go On

Last fall, as my mom lay dying in Greensboro's Moses Cone Hospital, a gifted palliative care nurse proved a Godsend. When it became clear my mom would not recover, this gentle, gracious woman became our life-line. She brought hope and help when my mom (and we) needed it most. Even so skilled a professional couldn't offer a cure, but she did offer a sensitive, calming presence and the expertise to keep mom comfortable on the final stretch of her journey Home.

This nurse was obviously pregnant. Indeed, she looked to be only days from giving birth to the new life within her. And that's why one day she brought us some hard news: "I'm afraid I won't be able to see ya'll to the end. Today is my last day, as I'm going on leave to have my baby."

There was a moment of shock and silence. Then I mustered the courage to tell her, "Good for you. Because that baby is a sign of the gift of new life. And we need that hope right now. So thanks for everything you have done and everything you have meant to our family. Now forget about us and go have that baby!"

She appeared moved by the comment. Then she turned to me misty-eyed and said, "Thanks. That means a lot." And before long, she left, and we never saw her again.

The poet Carl Sandburg said, "A baby is God's opinion that life should go on." Fortunately, those of us who work at Knollwood have been blessed by the presence of a new baby: Max Godwin, the beautiful, adorable, and eminently huggable son of Josh and Alyssa (see page 11 for a pic!). Baby Max is a heartfelt reminder that life goes on, even in the face of transition and loss.

Sadly, my treasured colleague, Marlin Yoder, has resigned effective March 29 (see articles on page 5). For me, as for other staff members and many in our church, it's hard to imagine life at Knollwood without Marlin. Indeed, I haven't *known* life at Knollwood without Marlin since he began his work here two months before me in the fall of 2011.

Marlin will be missed for everything he *does*: resurrecting failed security, heating, and computer systems; erecting the sets for Vacation Bible School; helping to set up and host the many events at KBC.

But Marlin will be missed even more for who he *is*: a listening ear, a calming presence, a servant leader, one of Jesus' best and brightest.

Still, Marlin is ready for a change and hopes to pursue his first love: helping people one-on-one with the kinds of service projects he excels in. And as much as I will miss him, I'm glad he has clarity, energy, and enthusiasm for this next chapter of his life.

And while the next church administrator will not be Marlin, she or he will bring a new set of skills and gifts to the job. That person will grow and challenge us in some new ways. I'm counting on that. Because one of the things I am learning is that every transition, even the unwanted ones, bring new opportunities for God's boundless, endlessly resourceful grace to shape and surprise us anew.

So go with our blessing, brother Marlin. Somehow, little Max and the rest of us will soldier on without you. Because Baby Godwin is "God's opinion that life at KBC must go on."

Last March, Knollwood wonderfully hosted the annual Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of NC General Assembly gathering. This year's meeting, marking the 25th Anniversary of CBFNC, will be at First Baptist in Greensboro.

On Thursday afternoon, March 28, Tod Bolsinger of California will offer help in guiding churches through today's uncharted territory and will help re-imagine what effective leadership looks like in dynamic cultural contexts.

Thursday evening CBFNC will celebrate our 25th anniversary at Revolution Mills in Greensboro, with Clyde Edgerton as featured speaker.

The primary General Assembly will take place Friday from 9 am to the conclusion at 5:30 pm back at First Baptist. Featured leaders will include Dr. Bolinger, author Edgerton, and musician Kyle Matthews. In addition, the General Assembly will offer three break-out times with a wide variety of special interest workshops, such as eco-theology, ministry in an age of polarization, Biblical perspectives on sexuality, serving refugees and immigrants, social media and teens, dealing with suicide, and many more.

Prayers for the Welfare of the City

During Lent, members and friends of Knollwood are invited to share in a daily practice of praying for the welfare of our city. The prayer texts run from Monday through Saturday and may be used each week during Lent, expressed at any time of day in any place. By sharing words and concerns, we create communal intercession and perhaps a wider reflection on our city than sometimes emerges in our prayers.

Yet we will also want to personalize these prayers. Each day, as you move through the series of intercessions, notice which one or two requests seem most pressing or vivid to you on that particular day. Slow down or stop. Express in your own words the concerns that most touch your imagination and spirit. In that way, our prayer practice may be shared but not rote, unified but not uniform. May grace be upon our city and upon you as you pray. Printed copies are available after worship and in the church office.


Committee Chair

I am eagerly awaiting my pre-ordered copy of a new book called *Parenting Forward: How to Raise Children with Justice, Mercy and Kindness* by one of my favorite bloggers and podcast hosts, Cindy Wang Brandt. While I was reading an interview with her this week, she said this about children in the church: *"True inclusion gives access to...the decision-making spaces. For children, it's not enough to tack children on to programs at the last minute and announce that children are very welcome. Children should be involved at the beginning of the planning process, and their opinions should be solicited and taken into consideration."*¹

I think Knollwood does a pretty good job with this all year long. Our children are regularly involved in leading worship through choirs, reading the Gospel lesson, and serving as acolytes and ushers. They participate actively in Sunday School, in Godly Play during Children's Worship and on Wednesday nights for kids.connect. But on Children's Sunday, we get to see a whole worship service that is created and led by our elementary-aged children. Hearing them step up with confidence to share their thoughts, offer their prayers, and show us how to worship always makes my heart swell.

I can tell already that this year will be no exception. We've been spending a lot of time talking, learning, wondering, experimenting, doing, and reflecting on the act of prayer. On March 17, our children will lead in worship as we all get the benefit of learning from them and understanding a little better about the mystery of prayer. Mark your calendars and plan to be with us; I can assure you that it will be a powerful Lenten experience.

PS: Remember that on this Sunday, our children write, plan and lead the whole service, including collecting a special offering. Bring your cash so those offering plates will overflow. All money collected will go toward Children's Ministry Missions Opportunities – a chance for children to live out justice, mercy and kindness in our community.
