## **Folding Our Tent**

Sunday, Nov. 14, was a momentous day at Knollwood.

On that day we received Communion, made our Giving and Service Commitments, heard our children's choirs sing, recognized our veterans, received new members, and much more.

But for me, one of the most memorable and saddest events of the day was when we folded our tent.

I'm speaking, of course, of the large white tent erected just outside the sanctuary each Sunday for the last several months. That tent provided both refuge and refreshment. It was the sacred place after worship where we could take off our masks and see each other face-to-face. It was the shelter where we could get a cup of lemonade and a cookie or some pretzels. The tent was where the Communion *after* the service began.

But now, with colder weather settling in, meeting outside is no longer practical. So for a spell, we'll have to settle for the customary handshake or hug after worship before walking briskly to our vehicles while shivering against the cold. No longer does a loving, lingering, maskless community beckon after worship, at least not until we can safely resume such fellowship indoors.

I'm going to miss our tent. It created a sacred, special space where we could safely weather the pandemic's storm in one another's company.

During her 40-year sojourn in the wilderness, Israel worshiped in a tent. The Bible calls it "the Tabernacle," which makes it sound big and important, which, of course, it was. But for all the high-flown religious language, the Tabernacle was basically a tent.

And centuries later, Israel's prophets and seers wistfully recalled the time when Israel worshipped in a tent. For that was the period of the nation's greatest dependency upon God and hence, the period of Israel's greatest faithfulness to God. As the prophet Jeremiah writes, "Thus says the Lord: I remember the devotion of your youth, your love as a bride, how you followed me in the wilderness" (Jeremiah 2:2).

What did Israel learn during her wilderness sojourn while worshiping in a tent? That God can be trusted. That God will provide. That no matter how great the obstacles and challenges, God finds a way.

And what have we learned as a congregation during this pandemic, as our trusty tent beckoned us to face-to-face community each Sunday after worship? That God can be trusted. That God will provide. That no matter how great the obstacles and challenges, God and God's people find a way.

So goodbye, Faithful Tent. We will miss you. But thanks for teaching us that this community and mission we hold in trust are not bound to any building or ritual. No, by God's grace, we can adapt and change and grow no matter how daunting our circumstances.

For even in the depths of a wilderness wrought by a pandemic and maybe especially there, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; God's mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning."

"Great is God's Faithfulness!" (Lam. 3:22-23).



## What We Have, and What We Hope For

In Advent, we are invited-- encouraged, even-- to feel the uncomfortable tension between what we have and what we hope for. We yearn for healing and for restoration that is not yet. One day, the decision will be made, the answer will come, and the problem will be resolved, but not yet. One day, the pandemic will be over, but

not yet. Soon, Christmas day will dawn with its joy of giving and receiving and celebrating a longed-for new birth. But not yet.

In the thick of this tension, we begin to tell the story of Jesus, reading and singing first of those who prepared the way for him, and of the angel's incredible announcement. We, too, prepare the way and announce the coming of Christ even though the wound still festers, the illness progresses, and the problem persists. And the pandemic is still not yet over!

As we begin to tell the stories of Jesus, may we allow Advent to teach us that God does not require our lives to be nicely tidied in order to show up. Indeed, God shows up in the middle of the night, in the grit of where animals sleep, to a fortuneless, exhausted couple. Aren't we sometimes that desperate and bedraggled? And sometimes, doesn't God birth a new hope into our mess?

In 2021, December at Knollwood is once again rich with opportunities to prepare the way for Christmas. Join us for the Wednesday night fellowship of Advent reflection and the barely rehearsed fun of a Christmas pageant. Come worship on Sunday mornings with hopeful music, stirring liturgies, and the powerful word proclaimed. Bring all that you have, and all that you hope for, too, as we share the hope of Advent together.

#### **ADVENT DEVOTIONAL**

In the coming weeks, each Knollwood household will receive Advent: A Calendar of Devotions. For each day of Advent, the lectionary text and a devotional reflection inspired by it is provided. 

### From Knollwood's Medical Team

The Knollwood Medical Team continues to advise the ministers and lay leaders on church protocols and policies in the ongoing pandemic. Joe Long leads the team, which includes four doctors: John Roach, Rebecca Wells, David Ramsay, and Chip Mims.

The team monitors trends in Forsyth County and beyond as we pursue safe ways for the congregation to worship, learn, play, and socialize in groups large and small. While Knollwood continues to require masking indoors in most situations, the team believes that the pandemic is getting more manageable, especially for vaccinated people. And now many Knollwood kids aged 5 to 11 have received their first shots, for which we are grateful.

Most recently, the team discussed proposals to replace outdoor gatherings, now that winter weather is approaching.

# Faith Formation & Education Minister Search Update

The Faith Formation & Education Minister Search Committee held two informational sessions on Sunday, Nov. 14, to update the congregation on its progress to date and to seek additional input on next steps.

Acknowledging that the pandemic had led to a longer-than-anticipated timeline, Sylvia Oberle, committee chair, reviewed the adjustments made to allow the committee to continue working even as the church responded to closings and mandates. In addition to conducting a congregational survey, the committee has done extensive research on recent church trends nationally as well as interviews with clergy fulfilling similar staff roles in other churches across the country.

Chris Gambill, director of the Center for Congregational Health and a consultant to the committee, stressed the importance of using this time of "disruption and change" to re-think approaches to faith formation in the life of the church.

Based on its assessment, the committee has recommended that the current 20-hour position be expanded to 25 hours a week, in keeping with current income projections of the church and reflecting emerging post-pandemic practices. From its assessment, the committee has also developed what it views as priorities for the Faith Formation and Education Ministry as well as essential attributes and characteristics of someone fulfilling that role.

The committee will continue to review congregational feedback, work with Finance and Personnel committees to monitor both year-end finances and giving commitments, finalize the job description, and be prepared to make any adjustments before beginning the actual search after the first of the year.

## Hymnal for the Next Generation

Once every couple of decades most churches reflect on their canon of song. Often a church discovers that newly written hymns resonate with the church's theology and mission, but are not found in their current hymnal.

Knollwood adopted The Worshipping Church hymnal in 1991, shortly after the hymnal was published. What a wonderful decision that was! It is a significant way Knollwood faithfully formed several generations of Christians to love

God and neighbor.

Many of the hymns we sing every week at Knollwood can be found in the pages of The Worshipping Church. We also know that there have been important contributions to congregational song and liturgy since the beginning of the 21st century, especially from our Christian brothers and sisters in Africa, Asia, and South America. Some of these songs are not part of our current hymnal, and yet they reflect the diversity of God's people that Knollwood celebrates and treasures. Additionally, modern-day hymn writers are always helping the church articulate and give voice to timeless truths in language that reflects the Spirit's work in the church and the world today.

We will be entering into this kind of conversation at KBC through the Hymnal Selection Committee, which has been recommended by the Worship and Music Committee and approved by the DEC this past October. The Hymnal Selection Committee will begin their work in January. One of the most important steps in this discernment process will happen/occur when we gather input from the congregation about beloved hymns and important traditions in Knollwood's worship life.
